3. **Medicaid:** Medicaid helps lots of people with low incomes, including many people with HIV, get health coverage. It covers things like doctor visits, hospital stays, and HIV treatment. Each state has its own rules for who can get Medicaid (Kaiser Family Foundation, 2022).
4. **Health Insurance Marketplaces:** These are websites where you can look at different health insurance plans and pick the one that's best for you. If you have HIV, you might be able to get help paying for your insurance through these websites (U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, 2022).
5. **Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs):** Some drug companies offer programs to help people who can't afford their medicine. These programs can help pay for HIV medicine and other prescriptions.

6. **Community-Based Organizations (CBOs):** These groups help people with HIV by offering things like counseling, support groups, and help with getting medical care and medicine.
7. **Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI):** If you can't work because of your HIV, you might be able to get money from SSDI or SSI to help pay for things like medicine and doctor visits.
